**Motorola steps to comply with the implementation of the REACH regulation in Europe.**

Dear customer,

REACH ("Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 18 December 2006 concerning the Registration, Evaluation, Authorization and Restriction of Chemicals") is a new European Union chemicals regulation that entered into the force of law on 1 June 2007, with phased deadlines to 2018.

At Motorola, we hold a deep and abiding respect for the environment. Equally, we hold a longstanding and ongoing commitment to the health and safety of our employees, customers, suppliers, partners and community neighbors. As such, Motorola business units have established processes and designated appropriate personnel to ensure compliance with the requirements of REACH.

**Registration & Notification (Article 7 of REACH)**

**Registration** is required according to article 7.1 of REACH if a substance is present in one article and totaling more than 1 tonne per producer, per importer, per year and the substance is intended to be released under normal conditions of use. Motorola's products are not designed to intentionally release a chemical or a substance into the environment. Therefore Motorola cannot register substances to the European Chemical Agency ECHA.

**Notification** is required according to Article 7.2 of REACH if a "substance of very high concern" (SVHC) is published on a formal list ("candidate list") provided by the European Chemical Agency (ECHA), where the substance is contained within a product ("article") and the substance weighs more than 0.1% (weight on weight of the complete article). According to article 7.7 of REACH this obligation takes effect 6 month after the substance is published on the ECHA "candidate list" not earlier than June 2011. If applicable, Motorola will take all appropriate steps to comply with this requirement.

**Communication (Article 33 of REACH)**

Motorola is aware that Article 33 of REACH requires suppliers to inform the recipients or consumers if a supplied article contains more than 0.1% (by weight per article) of any substance(s) on the SVHC candidate list. However, this requirement will only become operational after the European Chemical Agency (ECHA) has published the candidate list. Once the candidate list is published Motorola will assess all applicable products/articles to determine if any substances are above the 0.1% (w/w) threshold, and thus require disclosure. ECHA has stated that publication of the candidate list will probably not occur before the end of 2008. Motorola will continue to monitor the status of the candidate list as part of our on-going compliance activities.

Motorola requires its supply base to fully disclose material, substances of concern and recycled material content, of each part with which we are supplied. Reporting is required in accordance with Motorola's "Controlled and Reportable Material Disclosure Specification" (reference: 12G02897W18, also called "W18). A complete W18 disclosure is required to qualify all parts supplied to Motorola.
